## PLANE "CRASH" AT SYWELL.

Incidents at Model Machines  
"Meet."

"LOOK-OUT!" shouted someone.

There was a ducking of heads, a whizzing of a propeller, and the next moment a crash and a wing torn from an aeroplane's body was lying on the ground.

This was one of a similar number of incidents at the Sywell aerodrome on Sunday afternoon, but lest anyone is apprehensive of a tragedy, it should be added that the aeroplanes which thus came to grief were model ones. They were the property of enthusiastic flyers who had come from Leicestershire and Warwickshire, as well as various parts of Northamptonshire, to hold the first meeting for the flight of model aeroplanes to be held in this county.

#### PARACHUTE DESCENT.

Among the interesting events at this display is included a parachute descent from a model aeroplane.

The Leicestershire and Warwickshire Model Aero Clubs are to attend the display.

#### 150 FEET UP.

One of the most interesting models made by Mr. Boys is a monoplane with a wing span of over four feet.

The longest flight so far made by this plane is two minutes five seconds, in which a height of about 150 feet was reached.
